- **Commit** to learning more about this very complex issue. Immigration reform is about human rights, human dignity, exploitation of low-wage labor, and a broken system that has not been fixed.
- **Create** opportunities for dialogue with members of your church, community and denomination to learn about immigrant communities, culture, faith and contributions to this nation from all over the world.
- **Challenge** publicly and from the pulpit misinformation. Take a stand against forces of intolerance, hate and those who insult the intelligence of African American people. Our ministries and messages are to help and not harm.
- **Connect** with men and women of faith from Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, and Latin America for example for a Missions/Unity Day, unity service to share the Good News in a transforming way.
- **Communicate** values of equality and fairness. We need a system that upholds our nation’s values and moves us closer together. That means a system where undocumented immigrants can register, unite with families and apply for citizenship without fear or intimidation.
- **Call** or email the office of your Member of Congress and invite them to come out to share what’s happening and why Immigration Reform is important to all people in order to truly be “one nation under God”.
- **Consciously** pray. One of the central messages from President Obama has been “our policies must recognize that we’re all in it together.” Lift up prayers often for wisdom, guidance and reform to unify neighborhoods, communities, cities, states and this nation.

### ***The country needs Comprehensive Immigration Reform to:***

- **Fix the broken immigration system** in this country. A comprehensive solution gets to the root of the problem, not one that perpetuates the failed enforcement-only policies of the past. A real solution to the immigration problem can and should address enforcement, but must also ensure that: immigrant workers are treated fairly.
- **Take into account both economic and human questions.** A comprehensive solution, such as the approach that was introduced by Congressman Luis Gutierrez this past December (CIR ASAP), is supported by a plethora of groups because it is fair and would work. Those who oppose a comprehensive solution would rather demagogue the issue than solve the problem.
- **Connect with the passage of the DREAM Act** (The Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors Act, S.729) which would give students who came to the United States before the age of 16 a chance to realize their dreams through the opportunity to pursue a higher education. It would reward hard work and academic achievement with legal residency and a chance to earn citizenship.
- **Clear a path to earned citizenship** for the 12 million undocumented immigrants who are here and contributing to our society by working hard and paying taxes without the opportunity to earn legal status.
- **Identify resources and information** that would facilitate informed conversations about rights, employment verification system, security, and strengthening America’s workforce.
- **Speak as compassionate, fair-minded Americans** ready to challenge and hold accountable all anti-immigrant media figures and public officials--especially those who use the issue of immigration to create racial division and resentment.
- **Celebrate the integration of New Americans** into this country from all around the world.
