- Currently is a partner, head of the Supreme Court Practice, and co-leader of the National Appellate Practice at Akin Gump Strauss Hauer & Feld in Washington, D.C.
- Named by the National Law Journal as one of the 100 Most Influential Lawyers in America

Cornelia "Nina" T.L. Pillard is a fair-minded, nationally respected law professor and experienced appellate lawyer with an extraordinary record of service.
